

ast April we held our second-annual fellows retreat in New York City. Building on our 2023 inaugural retreat, each fellow wrote an essay to discuss, evaluate, and hone together in groups. Pastors in the city led heartfelt devotional and prayer times.

Christopher Watkin presented on what he has learned about the preaching style of Tim Keller from listening to every sermon of Tim's preaching ministry at Redeemer from 1989 to 1999. Michael Keller shared about a book project that he and his dad





What Is Cultural Apologetics?

im Keller said, "The job of the missionary is to enter sympathetically the worldview/story of the culture yet challenge and re-tell the culture's story so they see their story will only have a happy ending in Jesus." This way of evangelism and apologetics has come to be captured by the term "cultural apologetics." Still, the concept goes largely undefined in any formal sense. This volume seeks to step into this conceptual gap. Gathering leading scholars and practitioners who serve as fellows at The Keller Center, this edited volume will define cultural apologetics, explain its biblical and historical grounding, and demonstrate how it is an important resource for the church today.

Our cultural climate offers unique opportunities to share the gospel in compelling ways. But we need the right posture, neither accommodation nor condemnation. We need a holistic theological anthropology so we can meet human longings with the truth, beauty, and goodness of the gospel of Jesus Christ. The church, inhabiting the culture's same social imaginaries, is simultaneously edified and renewed by this sort of apologetic. Churches that practice cultural apologetics in their teaching and life together offer a compelling alternate society that preserves the integrity of their faith and the effectiveness of their outreach.

This volume guides Christians and churches who desire missionary encounters that result in hearts transformed and renewed by the power of the gospel.



"You are the stories you believe."

his is one of the most critical lines of a forthcoming book collaboration between Michael Keller and his late father, Tim Keller. Most people don't go about their day thinking, Oh, let me deal with this board meeting with Nietzschean will to power, use Foucault in my sexuality this evening, and give it a smidge of coherence from an identity achieved through expressive individualism.


Instead people intuit their way through life with more rudimentary stories—we call these "cultural narratives." We need historical and philosophical perspective to understand the quilted patchwork of worldviews knit together to create these narratives. But we also need help interacting in everyday conversation with our friends, family, and neighbors.

The Keller Center has begun a multi-year initiative to do two simple things:


- 1. Identify and introduce various cultural narratives.
- 2. Equip readers and viewers with tools to persuasively interact with those stories.

We aim to accomplish these two goals by launching a well-curated digital hub for resources including videos, essays, and especially books. By 2026 we expect to publish curriculum for small groups and Sunday schools.






